The family history of Dionisio Lolli, his 6 children, and our Italian roots.

FROM ITALY TO AMERICA

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

I have been unable to go back very far in our Lolli family history. The first known migration to the United States by our direct family appears to be in 1902. It's been difficult to find Italian records online so I can only research so far. To pursue additional information, I will have to engage a local genealogist.

Per Wikipedia – LOLLI is an Italian surname. Notable people with that surname include:

- Antonio Lolli (1725-1802), Italian violinist and composer
- Claudio Lolli (born 1950), Italian singer-songwriter.
- Giambatista Lolli (1698-1769), Italian chess player.

It makes you wonder if any of these people are relatives. Research for another day.

Per Namespedia, the surname LOLLI is found at least 2,673 times in at least twenty countries, with by far the largest population being in Italy, and the second largest being in the United States.

On Ancestry.com, there is a reference to the Oxford University Press that the name is Southern Italian, and the patronymic or plural form of Lollo, an offensive nickname from Sicilian Iollu "silly', "stupid', from the classical Greek Lollos 'mad". It figures!

Southern Italian

The sea surrounds Italy, and mountains crisscross the interior, dividing it into regions. The Alps cut across the top of the country and are streaked with long, thin glacial lakes. From the western end of the Alps, the Apennines mountains stretch south down the entire peninsula.

Italy is divided into 20 regions, then 110 provinces, then cities, and villages.

Our family appears to be from the region of Abruzzo. While geographically it is in central Italy, it is classified as being southern Italian based on its culture, language, history, and economy.

Abruzzo Region

Abruzzo (Italian: [a'bruttso]; Abbrzzu) is an area of 4,156 square miles with a population of 1.2 million. Its' western border lies 50 miles east of Rome.

Abruzzo Italy is known as "the green lung of Europe" for its three National Parks, one Regional Park and several natural reserves. Around a third of the region is protected nature and this makes the region the largest naturalistic area in the European continent, with 75% of the flora and fauna species in Europe.





It is an undisputed historical fact that Abruzzo was indeed one of Italy's poorest regions in the past; cut off by its mountains, controlled by the Kingdom of the 2 Sicilies, its residents' "poverty" resulting in multiple diasporas of hard-working Abruzzesi to Switzerland, Scotland, Canada, the US and Australia.

Teramo Province

The Abruzzo region is divided into four provinces, L'Aquila, Teramo, Pescara, and Chieti. The Lolli's come from the Teramo Province of Italy.

Teramo is one of the most significant areas where extra virgin olive oil and Abruzzo wines are produced. Unique of the province of Teramo is the short distance between the beaches of the Adriatic Sea and the 3,000-metre (9,800 ft) snowcapped Gran Sasso peaks.

Village of Forcella

Forcella is the village where our Lolli ancestors are most recently from.

This village is located within the city of Teramo which is in the province of Teramo. Forcella has a current population of two hundred and sixty-five people.

In November of 2004 my brother Jim Lolli, his wife Carol, and son Christopher, took my father Anthony Lolli on a trip to Italy. They visited the village of Forcella. They were not able to stay long to do research, but per the local priest the Lolli's were "large families" and "many Lolli's here."

Lolli Migration

Per a history of migration on the PBS channel, between 1880 and 1924, more than four million Italians immigrated to the United States, half of them between 1900 and 1910 – the majority were fleeing <u>grinding rural poverty</u> in Southern Italy and Sicily. Today, Americans of Italian ancestry are the nation's fifth largest ethnic group.

A father and two sons were our first settlers in the United States in the 20th Century:

- Francisco Lolli, the father arrived in New York in 1902.
- Ferdinando Lolli, son of Francisco Lolli, arrived in New York in 1907.
- Eugenio Lolli, son of Francisco Lolli, arrived in New York in 1910.

These ancestors all list Philadelphia, Pennsylvania as their destination on their arrival paperwork. It was the husband of their Aunt Filomena that first immigrated to the United States in 1902 and it appears he was the 'Godfather' of all subsequent family immigrations. His assistance was often used by either financing their travel, staying with him in Philadelphia, finding them work, or simply use his address in their paperwork as he would always know where to locate the family.

All the Lolli's listed above descend from a man called **Dionisio Lolli** who is our current end-of-line ancestor. To go back any further, we would need to hire a professional genealogist in Italy to assist us.


EUGENIO LOLLI'S FAMILY FROM ITALY

The numbers next to the children's name signify their birth order within Dionisio's family. You'll notice they are not in birth order but with my immediate family relatives first.

Eugenio Lolli, my grandfather is the son of the fourth child of Dionisio, Francisco Lolli.



Susan Lolli You are the daughter of Anthony Lolli Little is known about our current end-of-line Italian ancestor, Dionisio Lolli. What I do have is derived from his children's documents that mention their father and mother. Currently, I have not found any personal documents for Dionisio himself.

Dionisio was mostly likely born prior to 1835. I base this on the birth of his first child. I can only assume he was born in the same area as his children, likely one of the small towns around Teramo, Italy

Dionisio Lolli married *Maria Angelica Luanti* prior to 1850 (based on birth of first child that year); likely in Caprafico. Caprifico which is a frazione in the Province of Teramo in the Abruzzo region of Italy. A frazione (plural: frazioni) is a small village or hamlet outside the main town.

Son Carmine was born about 1850 in Caprifico.¹

Daughter **Angeladea** was born about 1852 in <u>Caprifico</u>.²

An assumption is that Dionisio's first wife died between 1852 and 1856.

Dionisio then married <u>Angeladea d'Innocenzo</u> sometime between 1852 and 1856.

It is estimated that his son **Marino** was born in 1856 in <u>Penna Sant' Andrea</u>, Teramo, Abruzzo, Italia ³

Son **Francisco** was born on 16 JUN 1858 ⁴

Daughter Filomena was born in 1863 ⁵ (per her tombstone).

Daughter **Domenica Lolli** was born on 23 JAN 1866 in <u>Penna Sant' Andrea</u>, Teramo, Abruzzo, Italia ⁶

Based on the information outlined in the bullets above we know that Dionisio, and his young family first lived in Caprifico, Teramo, Abruzzo, Italy. It is likely that Dionisio moved on to the next village after his first wife died. Sometime between 1852-1856, we see his family living in Penna Sant'Andrea, a winding 2 hour and 10-minute walk south.

I have further records for Dionisio's children but so far, none of them prove when Dionisio died. All we know is that he died sometime after 1866 when his last daughter was born.

At least two of Dionisio's six children immigrated to the United States.



The chart below shows the descendants from **Dionisio Lolli** down through his son **Francisco Lolli**. Francisco (dark yellow box) moved to the United States where his descendants of his two sons were all born U.S. citizens. His two sons (orange boxes) and most of their descendants wound up in Middletown, Ohio. Anthony lived in Michigan and Paul lived in Idaho.

Susan Lolli You are the daughter of Anthony Lolli Francisco Lolli was born in Forcella, Teramo, Abruzzi, Italy on the 16th of June 1858 to **Dionisio Lolli** and his second wife, **Angeladea D'Innocenzo**.

I will assume that his name was originally spelled Francesco vs. Francisco since that is the most common given name of males in Italy. Without access to his birth certificate, I have spelled his name Francisco since that is the spelling given all (but one) census record, his death certificate and gravestone. Earlier references such as the ship manifest from his immigration and an early census document spells his name Francesco.

He first married a women named **Maria Dorazio**, likely in Forcella and had at least two sons.

Their son **Ferdinando** was born on May 19, 1889, when Francisco was 30 years old. About 3 years later, their son **Eugenio** who was born on January 19, 1892, when Francisco was 33 years old. Both children were born in Forcella, Teramo, Abruzzi, Italy.

Family lore states Francisco's first wife Maria died about 1896 about when Ferdinando and Eugenio were six and four years old respectively.

Immigration

On April 2, 1902, at the age of 43, Francisco left for the United States in search of a better life for his family. His boys were 13 and 10 years old, so he had to leave them with someone, I assume the second wife.

On April 15, 1902, ⁷ Francisco arrived in New York on the ship<u>Aller</u>, sailing from Naples, Italy and arrived in New York, New York. His occupation was listed as a farmer and his last residence was Teramo (Teramo is the region where the village of Forcella is located).

It would have taken 56 hours to walk to Naples prior to the ship departure so I wonder if he had another mode of transportation to help get him there and if there was, how he afforded it. Otherwise, it may have taken him a minimum of five days to just walk to the ship that would take him to America.

The ship manifest lists his destination as Philadelphia, Pennsylvania to join his brother-inlaw, Giuseppe Ciardelli who was listed as paying for his passage.

The manifest further states that he was married, that he could not read and write, and that he arrived with \$14 in his pocket. He immigrated alone, then 5 years later, his first son Ferdinando arrived in 1907. His son Eugene joined them 3 years after that once he turned 18. Can you imagine not seeing your father for eight years and your brother for 3 years?

Tale of the Two Mothers

We know that Francisco was married twice. The first being the mother of his two boys and the second marriage possibly occurring shortly after the first wife died. Outside of their names, we really do not know much about either woman. The first wife died in Italy, and we assume the second never left Italy based on the lack of evidence showing they immigrated. Facts about the two wives:

- 1. Francisco's ship manifest (arriving 15 Apr 1902, age 44) lists him as being married but he traveled alone.
- 2. Ferdinando's military paperwork (6 Feb 1934, age 44) lists his mother as 'Maria Lolli Maiden Name -> Dorazio'

- 3. Eugenio's Social Security paperwork (dated 25 Nov 1936, age 44) lists his mother as 'Mary Diorozio.'
- 4. Death certificate of son Eugenio lists his mother as Maria Carmelita. Informant was his son Albert Lolli.
- 5. The 1910 federal census (dated 19 May), Francisco is listed as being married twice ('M2') and currently married for 8 years. This means the second marriage happening about 1902. Did he marry her in Italy and leave her to take care of the boys while he went to America? If so, did she die prior to Francisco sending for her. Or maybe she did not want to come?
- 6. In 1910, on Eugenio's immigrant passenger list, he lists his closest relative back in Italy as his 'stepmother Angela', which is probably his grandmother, Angeladea d'Innocenzo. Was the 'mother' from his father's second marriage dead, so Eugenio went to live with his grandmother?

ASSUMPTION on the "Who's Your Momma" dilemma:

- 1. Maria Dorozio is the mother of both boys, and she died while they were young. Based on both sons listed her on documentation they filled out when they were much younger.
- 2. **Maria Carmelita is the stepmother.** Based on Maria Carmelita name was listed on Eugenio's death certificate; this is based on secondhand information given by a son. Also, this son may have heard his father talk about the Maria Carmelita more than his biological mother since Eugenio was too young when his real mom died. Also, Anthony Lolli stated that his grandmother died when his father was very young.
- 3. Francisco Lolli married Maria Carmelita about 1902 and she died prior to 1930 based on the 1910 census which stated he was married 8 years at that point. We cannot locate him in the 1920 census but in the 1930 census he is listing himself as widowed.

1910 United States Federal Census

Based on the United States Census of 1910⁸, under the designation of married it states 'M2' and it indicates that Francisco had been married eight years. It appears he remarried sometime in 1901 or 1902 when Francisco would have been about 12, and Eugenio about 10-years-old.

Francisco and his son Eugenio were day laborers living at the Italian Camp on Barge Canal #23, near East Henrietta Road in Brighton, New York. He had been out of work about four months in the previous year (1909). Francisco was 52 years of age, and Eugenio was 18. There were a total of fifty-nine people living at that camp location, ranging in age from 13 years old with Francisco being the oldest at 52.

His son Fernando and his cousin 'Dionese' Lolli, both 21 years old lived in the Austrian Camp working on the same canal. Dionese (full name Dionisio) was the son of Francisco's brother Marino which makes him a first cousin to Ferdinando and Eugenio.

The New York Barge Canal, which is now known as the New York State Canal System, is a successor to the Erie Canal and other canals within New York. The 525mile system is composed of the Erie Canal, the Oswego Canal, the Cayuga-Sececa Canal, and the Champlain Canal. The construction of the Barge Canal began in 1905 and was completed in 1918 at a cost of \$96.7 million.

While this is not a picture of one of our relatives, it is a picture of an Italian worker at one of the barge houses at the canal.

1920 United States Federal Census

I could not find any information about Francisco in the 1920 U.S. Federal census. It was not unusual for people to not respond to a census or to have their names misspelled making finding the documents difficult to find.

His son Ferdinand's passport application of 1920⁹, states that he was living in Milton, Ohio (could be Middletown) at this time. Maybe his father Francisco was living there as well? Milton is within the municipality of Dayton Ohio.

Son Ferdinando travels back to Italy on March 18, 1920, and marries there. He returns to the United States with his new wife Luisa Ranalli on the SS Duca D'Aosta on March 31, 1921. They listed their destination as 909 Annin, Philadelphia, PA., his uncle's house.

Son Eugenio married Giovanna Lungaro on April 29, 1923, in Chicago, Cook County, Illinois.

1930 United States Federal Census

By 1930 (April 20) ¹⁰, Francisco, 71 years old, is widowed and living with son Ferdinando and his wife Louisa and their 3 kids at 1341 Garfield, in Middletown, Ohio. Francisco immigrated in 1902. His son and wife are naturalized, but he is not. Ferdinando cannot read or write and cannot speak English. Francisco's son Eugenio lived next door with his wife and their four children.

1940 United States Federal Census

Sometime between 1930 and 1935, his son Ferdinando and his family, which included his father Francisco (82 years old) moved to <u>2109 Queen Street</u> in Middletown, Ohio. Francisco did not speak English and he had not applied for U.S. citizenship. ¹¹

1950 United States Federal Census

In April of 1950¹² the census was taken showing Francisco still living at 2109 Green Street with son Ferdinando, his wife Louisa, and two sons. Francisco is now 91 years

old, and still widowed. His son Ferdinando died in December of that same year and Francisco went to live with his son Eugenio on the farm.

Francisco's Death

By 1951, Francisco was suffering from senility and arteriosclerosis cardio renal disease. On February 23rd of that year, Francisco fell at home and fractured his right hip.

Four months later, Francisco died at the age of 93 at 5 a.m. on June 21, 1951. His place of death was listed as Rural Route #2, Middletown, Ohio where he had resided for eleven months. His name was spelled "Francisco" on his death certificate and interestingly, his mother's maiden name was

He was buried at Woodside Cemetery in Middletown, Ohio on June 25, 1951.

Susan Lolli You are the daughter of Anthony Lolli Eugenio was born on January 19, 1892, in Forcella, Teramo, Abruzzi, Italy. His father Francisco was thirty-three years old. It is unknown how old his mother, Maria Dorazio was but we assume she was born before 1874.¹³ He had an older brother Ferdinando who was born on 19 May 1889 so he would have been about two and a half when Eugenio was born.


Eugenio stated his mother died when he was very young, maybe about 1896. Francisco would have been either six or seven and Eugenio would have been around four.

It appears that his father remarried a woman named Maria Carmelita who may have been the only mother they remember.

Immigration

When Eugenio was 18 years old, Eugenio immigrated to the Unites States and entered the country at Ellis Island, New York, New York on the ship SS Oceana on March 23, 1910. I

have been unable to locate his name on a ship manifest, but a certificate of arrival was issued in 1940, likely as part of his naturalization process.



1910 Census

In the 1910 United States Census¹⁴, Eugenio along with his father Francisco, his brother Ferdinando, and a cousin, named Dionisio Lolli were listed as living at the Italian Camp on Barge Canal #23 near East Henrietta Road in Brighton, New York. At 18 years old, Eugenio and his family were day laborers working the canals and living in a dormitory. This census confirms the fact that Eugenio immigrated in 1910.

World War I

World War I, or "The Great War" lasted from July 28, 1914, to November 11, 1918. On April 6, 1917, the United States declared war on Germany, more than two and a half years after the start of the war. The first registration for the draft, began on June 5, 1917, for all men between the ages of 21 and 30.¹⁵

As part of that group, Eugenio registered at the age of 24 on June 5, 1917, but was never drafted.

His registration card shows he was living in Huntington, Indiana at <u>1037 21st Street</u>. He worked for the Erie Railroad Company as a "Locomotive Head Light Tender". A tender or coal-car is a special rail vehicle hauled by a steam locomotive containing its fuel (wood, coal, or oil) and water. Steam locomotives consume large quantities of water compared to the quantity of fuel, so their tenders are necessary to keep them running over long distances.

His draft card also validates that he was born in Forcella, Italy and that he has officially declared 'his intention" to become a citizen. He was single, of medium height (maybe for that time) and build, with black hair and dark brown eyes. Interesting point is that he responded 'no' to the question regarding disabilities. His thumb accident must have occurred shortly after this as Anthony Lolli stated it occurred while working for the railroad.

This is where he may have met his future wife Jennie Lungaro. The story goes that they met one day when Jennie brought lunch to her brother who was also working on the railroad.





1920 Census

In the 1920 census, I found Eugenio living at <u>1821 Hamilton Avenue</u> in Lorain, Ohio as a boarder. He was single and worked as a Chipper at a Steel Company. His native tongue was Italian, and he could read and write. He lived with a family of seven with five kids under 12 and two additional boarders. ¹⁶

Marriage

Eugene (name as listed) married Jennie Lungaro on 29 April 1923 in Cook County, Illinois ¹⁷. He was 31 years old while Jennie was 19.

Four of their five children were born in quick succession. Frank Albert was born in 1924. Their second son, Anthony was born the next year on 4 October 1925. Followed by the twins, James Edward, and Louise Marie in 1929.

1930 Census

In 1930, Eugene and his family were living at <u>1339 Garfield</u> in Middletown, Butler County, Ohio. Eugene rented their home and paid \$15 monthly rent, that's \$240 in today's dollars.

Eugene was born in Italy and immigrated in 1912 (in conflict with the paperwork we have which states 1910); he is registered as an alien.

He was working in the shipping gang at Armco Steel. Living with them are their sons Albert, 6 years old; Anthony, 4 years old; and twins, a girl and boy named Louise and James, almost a year old.

Eugene's brother, Ferdinando and his family lived next door. Their father, Francisco, lived with Ferdinando.¹⁸

Social Security

The Social Security Act,¹⁹ signed into law by President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1935, created Social Security, a federal safety net for elderly, unemployed and disadvantaged Americans. The main stipulation of the original Social Security Act was to pay financial benefits to retirees over age 65 based on lifetime payroll tax contributions. Registration for an account number began in November 1936.

Eugene's application states he was forty-four years old and was still living in the same house as the 1930 Census. He was working at The American Rolling Mill Company located at the East Side Works in Middletown. He lists his father's name as Frank Lolli (nickname for Francisco) and lists mother as <u>Mary Diorozio</u>.

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Death of Son

His son, James Edward, or 'Jimmy-Boy' as he was called, died March 29, 1939, after an extended case of pneumonia. He was born with a genetic condition now called Down syndrome. In 1866 British physician, John Langdon Down, for whom the syndrome is now named, first described Down syndrome, as "Mongolism." The term Down syndrome didn't become the accepted term until the early 1970s. ²¹


Down Syndrome is caused by an extra chromosome, and it is the most common chromosomal anomaly in humans. There is no definitive scientific research that indicates that Down syndrome is caused by environmental factors or the parents' activities before or during pregnancy. The additional partial or full copy of the 21st chromosome which causes Down syndrome can originate from either the father or the mother.

Anthony Lolli said Jimmy-boy was tough; he used to carry around a bat to defend himself and his siblings. His short life and death made such an impact on his older brother's life that years later, Anthony named his only son after him.

Here is a copy of Jimmy-boy's obituary and a picture of his tombstone in Woodside Cemetery in Middletown, Ohio. JAMES LOLLI

1940 Census

Eugene's wife Jennie provided the answers to the census worker who reported the highest-grade Eugene had completed as: elementary school, 2nd grade. Jennie completed 7th grade. Eugene rented their home, and they paid \$10 monthly rent. That's \$191 in today's dollars. Eugene is still a laborer in the shipping department of a Steel Mill. His citizenship status was recorded as <u>first papers</u>, meaning he had begun the naturalization process.

Their children living with them are Frank Albert, age 15; Anthony, age 14; Louise, age 10; and Paul, age 2. Oldest boys were

born in Illinois, and the younger two in Ohio. Albert has completed his second year of high school, Anthony completed 8th grade, and Louise completed 4th grade. ²²

World War II

"By the summer of 1940, as Germany conquered France, Americans supported the return of conscription (compulsory enlistment for state service, typically into the armed forces). One national survey found that 67% of respondents believed that a German- Italian victory would endanger the United States, and that 71% supported "the immediate adoption of

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compulsory military training for all young men.... President Roosevelt's signing of the Selective Training and Service Act on September 16, 1940, began the first peacetime draft in the United States ... the law required the registration of all men between 19 and 57. After Pearl Harbor, the law was amended (December 19, 1941), extending the term of service to the duration of the war plus six months and requiring the registration of all men 18 to 64 years of age.

During World War II, 49 million men were registered, 36 million classified, and 10 million inducted." $^{\rm 23}$

On April 26, 1942, as required, Eugenio registered for the draft at the age of fifty-one. $^{\rm 24}$

Eugenio had applied for United States Naturalization on the July 31, 1941. Per the 1940 census, he is listed as having his first papers. But in December of that year, he was interred as an enemy alien, even though his initial papers were in, and his son Albert was in the United States Marines.

In February 1942, he was released from internment and cleared of all charges.

The draft registration lists a description of the registrant as follows: white, 5'4", 154 pounds, brown hair, brown eyes, and a dark complexion. Other obvious physical characteristics are a 'thumb off the right hand.'

Internment Camps

During World War II, Eugenio was arrested and interred in a World War II internment camp here in the United States. His only crime was being born in Italy. During the early years of World War II however, that was enough to classify him as an "enemy alien"—and to justify freezing his assets, interrogating his family, and interning him for months.

Eugenio was just one of at least 600,000 Italians and Italian Americans—many of them naturalized citizens (Eugenio was not) —swept up in a wave of racism and persecution during World War II. Hundreds of Italian "enemy aliens" were sent to internment camps like those Japanese Americans were forced into during the war. More than 10,000 were forced from their homes, and hundreds of thousands suffered curfews, confiscations, and mass surveillance during the war. They were targeted despite a lack of evidence that the Italians were conducting spy or sabotage operations in the United States.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt proclaimed undocumented Italians residing in America to register and carry cards identifying themselves as "enemy aliens." It further forbade them from traveling more than five miles from their homes

without written authority and forced the surrender of such "contraband" as firearms, radios, cameras, and flashlights that might be used as signaling devices. A mandatory daily curfew was imposed from 8 p.m. to 6 a.m., thus restricting their freedom of movement, and means of employment.

Knowledge of the persecution and internment suffered by the Italians during WWII has all but been forgotten. Much of this is because the Italians themselves wanted to quickly put this very difficult experience behind them. They loved the United States and only wanted to continue to achieve the dreams that they had come to this country to pursue.

1950 Census

Eugene, age 57, and Jennie, age 46, lived on a farm at 225 Well Rd. (1/2 mile left on route) in Lemon, Butler County, Ohio.

Eugene was now a naturalized citizen. Their daughter Louise is now 21, and son Paul is 12. Also living with them are their married son Frank A., age 25 and his wife, Patricia, age 22 with their daughter Virginia who was born in July of the previous year.

Eugene continues to work in the shipping department at the Steel Mill. Their son Frank is a hand shearer working 40 hours per week at the Steel Mill. Daughter Louise is a salesclerk working 44 hours a week at a retail grocery store. ²⁵

Farm Retirement

At first, Eugene and his wife rented a farm in West Middletown. Per their son Paul, they had a horse. In 1947, a directory lists Eugene and Jennie lived on Rural Route 2. I am assuming that is the 12-acre farm they had in Blue Ball.

"Blue Ball is a community in Butler and Warren counties, in the U.S. state of Ohio. The community was established in 1820 at the intersection of the Dixie Highway (later U.S. Route 25). Blue Ball was annexed by nearby Middletown in 1994. Blue Ball was so named because that image appeared on its tavern's signboard for the benefit of the illiterate."

I remember the farm as not having running water but a pump in the kitchen and an outhouse. They had a hen house and a field of corn. Eugene worked for Armco Steel Mill for twentynine years from 1928 until his retirement in 1957 at the age of sixty-five.

Florida Retirement

It was not long after his retirement that Eugene and his wife Jennie decided to move to Florida for Jennie's health. She had a heart condition developed from having had rheumatic fever early in life. In 1958 and 1959, they were living in Fort Meyer, Florida at 2256 Crawford.



By 1960, they had exchanged Florida coasts and had moved the 140 miles across the state to Hollywood, Florida, at <u>2221 North 56th</u> <u>Terrace</u>.

As a child, I remember visiting them in their Hollywood house. It was August, which was the only time my father could get vacation time. Their house was not air conditioned so summertime could get miserable.

The doctors in Florida indicated that Florida was not the ideal place for Jennie so eventually they moved back to Middletown, to <u>2315 Roosevelt Ave</u> which was located across the street from a park in front of one of the Armco facilities.

Later Years

After his wife Jennie died in December of 1969, Eugenio moved around a bit. At first, he lived on his own with an older man taking care of him. Ultimately, he primarily lived in Middletown with his son Albert during the summers and his son Paul in Sacramento in the winters. Eugene was known for walking for miles most days which likely contributed to his longevity. After Paul moved to Idaho, he no longer stayed with Paul.

One winter he stayed with his son Anthony in the Detroit area where he would walk multiple miles to the Italian bakery to buy bread. He also was known for having whiskey in his coffee in the morning and his favorite food was spaghetti.

Physical Characteristics

In his younger years Eugene had dark brown eyes and black hair. Then is went to a grey-brown hair until he just wore it bald. He stood 5 feet, 4 inches tall and weighed 154 lbs. He had no thumb on his right hand having had an accident at an early career railroad job.

Death

Eugenio died on September 1, 1984, of lung cancer. He was living with his son Albert at the time.

He had been ill since April.

Ferdinando was born on January 19, 1892, in Forcella, Abruzzi, Italy. His father Francisco was thirty years old, and his mother was Maria Dorazio, but currently, I don't know her age. His younger brother Eugenio (my grandfather) was born in 1892 when Ferdinando was two.

His brother Eugenio said that his mother died when he was young, maybe about 1896 making Ferdinando about seven years old.

His father remarried a woman named Maria Carmelita who may have been the only mother Ferdinando and Eugenio remember.

Immigration

When Ferdinando was 18 years old, he immigrated to the United Stated through New York on 5 Jun 1907.²⁷ His father, Francisco had immigrated a little over five years prior.

1910 Census

Through the 1910 United States Federal Census,²⁸ I found Ferdinando with his father Francisco, his younger brother Eugenio, and a cousin named Dionisio Lolli, all building the canal in New York state. Francisco and Eugenio were living in the Italian Camp and Francisco and Dionisio were in the Austrian camp at Barge Canal #23 near East Henrietta

Ferdinando was 21 years old and working as a day laborer. This census confirms the fact that he immigrated in 1907. It also indicates that he had only worked eight weeks the previous year.

World War I

World War I,²⁹ or "The Great War" lasted from 28 July 1914 to 11 November 1918. On April 6, 1917, the United States declared war on Germany, more than two and a half years after the start of the war. The first registration for the draft, began on 5 June 1917, for all men between the ages of 21 and 30.

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As part of that group, Ferdinando registered on the first day of registration at the age of 28, on June 5, 1917.

On his registration paperwork he lists that he was 28 (born on 19 May 1889) and is an Italian alien (not naturalized to the U.S. yet). He was living at <u>909 Annin Street</u> in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. This is the home of his Aunt Filomena (Lolli) and Uncle Guiseppe Ciardelli. Ferdinando is listed as working in a tin shop.

He was inducted into the army on May 25, 1918. Less than two months later he was sent

overseas on July 8, 1918 and did not return until May 29, 1919.

Per his veterans compensation papers, he was in the 316 Infantry, 79th Division and had a defensive position at Meuse-Argonne (Montfaucon). ³⁰

"The Meuse–Argonne offensive (also known as the Meuse River–Argonne Forest offensive, the Battles of the Meuse–Argonne, and the Meuse–Argonne campaign) was a major part of the final Allied offensive of World War I that stretched along the entire Western Front. It was fought from September 26, 1918, until the Armistice of November 11, 1918, a total of 47 days. The Meuse–Argonne offensive was the largest in United States military history, involving 1.2 million American soldiers. It is also the deadliest battle in the history of the United States Army, resulting in over 350,000 casualties, including 28,000 German lives, 26,277 American lives and an unknown number of French lives."

He sailed on the USS Texas³² back to the United States on May 16, 1919 from St. Nazaine, France which was the most important port used by the United States in France in WWI. He was honorable discharged on June 9, 1919, back to Philedelphia.

Naturalization

Nine months later, Ferdinando petitioned for United States citizenship on **March 5**, **1920**.

This document proves the follow information:

- Born: 19 May 1889 in Forcella, Italy
- Father: Francisco
- Current Location: Milton, Ohio
- He left Italy from Naples and arrived 5 Jun 1907.
- He lists his address as 909 Annin, Philadelphia, PA.

The document on the next page seems minimally completed and I thought that strange until I checked into it.

Under the Act of May 9, 1918, service members only needed proof of enlistment and testimony from two witnesses to naturalize. The law exempted them from having five years of U.S. residency, filing a declaration (or "first papers"), speaking English, and taking history and civics exams.

His military service was a hard price to pay for citizenship but well deserved.



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U.S. Passport

Ferdinando completed his paperwork for a United States passport³³ on **July 3**, **1920** in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Ferdinando also described himself as: 30 years of age, and 5'4". His complexion is dark and his eyes and hair are brown. He is missing the first joint of his second finger on his left hand.

Per his passport application, Ferdinando was living in Middletown, Ohio and he planned to sail to Italy on August 20, 1920 . 34

Marriage




While in Italy, he married Luisa Ranalli (1920). She was born November 27, 1888, in Pacentro, L'Aquila, Teramino, Abruzzo, Italy, making her about 32 years old, while Ferdinando was 31. We do not have the original marriage record, just a copy that someone must have sent for in March of 1951.

Luisa was added to Ferdinando's passport prior to their return.

The newlyweds sailed back to the United States on March 31, 1921, via the SS. Duca D'Aosta. They list their destination as 909 Annin Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, which is his

Aunt Filomena's house. This conflicts with him stating that he lived in Middletown, Ohio on his passport application. In addition, their first son Francisco Lolli was born in Philadelphia November 3, 1923.

1930 Census

By April 30, 1930, ³⁵ Ferdinando Lolli and his wife, both age 41, both naturalized, lived at <u>1341 Garfield</u> in Middletown, Butler County, Ohio. They were married 10 years ago. He owned his home which was valued at \$6,000, which is \$94,946 in today's dollars.

He was working as a laborer in a steel mill. Living with them was Ferdinando's father, Francisco, their sons Francisco (Frank) 6 years old and born in Pennsylvania, Mario, 5 years old, and daughter Marie A. 2.5 years old, both born in Ohio.

Ferdinando's brother Eugenio rented a house next door.

Veteran's Compensation Application

I'm including a military document that lists his military enlistment date, time overseas and honorable discharge date. The most important information is that it shows who Ferdinando documented as his mother; **Maria Dorazio**.

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1940 Census

By the April 23, 1940, census, ³⁶ the family was living at <u>2109 Queen Avenue</u>, Middletown, Ohio. They owned the home which was valued at \$3,500 (\$66,763 in today's dollars). Ferdinando, age 50, was working as a laborer at a steel rolling manufacturer. He worked 52 weeks last year and made \$1425. His wife Louise was also 50 years old.

The census lists that Ferdinando had completed school through the third grade, but his wife Luisa had not attended school.

Ferdinando's father, Francisco still lived with them, and the children were Francisco (Frank) age 16, Mario age 15 and Marie age 13.

World War II

Prior to the United States entry into World War II, a draft was implemented. The Selective Service Act, signed by President Franklin Delano Roosevelt in September of 1940, required men ages 21 to 36 to register with local draft boards in anticipation of possible conscription. Rather than wait to be called up, many volunteered; this allowed them to choose their branch of

service. By the time the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor, U.S. military forces already numbered nearly 2.2 million. By war's end, about 16 million served in the U.S. armed forces, over 60% of them as draftees.

Over 16 million men registered in that first round on 16 October 1940. A series of additional registrations followed. Younger men needed to be recorded as they came of age. In 1942, the age of new registrants dropped to 20 and then to 18. Older men registered in 1942, too: first, those up to age 44, and subsequently, older men (45-64) who might be asked to serve in non-military capacities.

The federal government assigned a serial number for the purposes of the draft lottery; local draft boards entered an order number. (If there's a letter in front of the serial number, it tells you which registration it was S=2nd; T=3rd; U=4th; N=5th; W=6th. No letter means it was either the first or last registration). Ferdinando was required to register but we do not have a copy of his draft card, but we do have a copy of his two son's draft registration. ³⁷

Both Francisco (Frank) and Mario served in WWII, both in the Navy.

1950 Census

By June 13, 1950, ³⁸ the family was still living at <u>2109 Queen Avenue</u>. Ferdinando's father Francisco was still living with his family and was ninety-one years old. The two sons, Francisco (always called Frank), 26, and Mario, 25, still resided with their parents. Ferdinando was still working at the steel mill.

Their daughter Marie had married in 1947 and was no longer living with the family.

Death

Francisco died on December 13, 1950, in Middletown, Ohio at the age of 61. I do not have his death certificate to state the cause of his death. He was buried on December 16, at Woodside Cemetery in Middletown, Ohio.

Luisa outlived her husband by almost 25 years. She died June 17, 1975, when she was 86.

Susan Lolli You are the daughter of Anthony Lolli Marino Lolli was an uncle of Eugenio Lolli and the great granduncle to Susan Lolli. Marino never left Italy so could have been someone that Eugenio was very familiar with while still in Italy without his father. Marino had at least 7 children that would have been peers of Eugenio. It appears the first 3 children immigrated to the United States. If traveling to Italy, we could still run into some of our remaining relatives from Marino.

Marino was born in 1856 in Penna S Andrea, Teramo, Abruzzo, Italy and at 62 years old died 13 Apr 1918 in Atri, Teramo, Abruzzo, Italy. His death record lists his father as Dionisio and his mother as Angeladea d'Innocenzo and his spouse's name as Maria Annunzia Sacchetti ³⁹.

Their Children:

1) Sante Lolli was born on 28 May1887 in Teramo, Italy. In 1911, Sante first traveled from Italy to Brantford, Canada where he worked as a laborer in a foundry. He had been working for 8 weeks, 60 hours each week and made \$80. He then traveled from Italy to New York in 1920 with a destination of Philadelphia, PA. On the 1920



passenger list, he states he had been in the U.S. before and "11/14" is listed. Based on that, one could assume that Sante was in Canada from 1911-1914. His naturalization papers state he ultimately left Naples. Italy on May 2, 1920, and arrived in New York on May

papers state he ultimately left Naples, Italy on May 2, 1920, and arrived in New York on May 14, 1920, on the ship <u>Duca</u> <u>D'Aosta</u>. He was a laborer, dark complextion, 5'6", 160 pounds, dark brown hair, and brown eyes. He applied for his citizenship 1 May 1929 with his brother Dionisio (machine operator) and Cousin John Ciardelli (merchant) were his character witnesses. ⁴⁰ Sante was granted citizenship on 27 Jun 1930. ⁴¹

LOLLI—Died at a local hospital Monday, April 28, 1952, Sante Lolli, of 1721 Ingram Avenue. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Elizabeth Utley Lolli: one stepdaughter, Mrs. Eugene McNew, of Mt. Clemmens, Mich.; one sister, Mrs. Anna DiCarlo, of Philadelphia, Pa.; three brothers, Dan Lolli, of Philadelphia. Pa., and two brothers in Italy; also two grandchildren. The remains are resting at the Joseph W. Billey Funeral Home, Third and Marshall, where services will be held Wednesday at 2 P. M. Interment in Maury Cemetery. 30EM

He married Elizabeth D. Utley (1896-1982) on 23 Apr1941 in Richmond, Virginia. His wife was a divorcee, also known as Lizzie Utley Cheatham. It was a late marriage for both as he was 53 years old, and she was 45. ⁴²

He made his living as a cement finisher.

Sante died on 23 Apr 1952 in Richmond, Virginia, he was 64 years old. He is buried in the Maury Cemetery with his wife. ⁴³ Sante succumbed to a heart attack he had 39 days prior. He had been suffering various heart issues for 5 years. ⁴⁴

2) Anna Lolli was born on Jun 6, 1888, in Teramo, Italy. At 33 years of age, she immigrated to the U.S. on her own with \$25 in her pocket. She left Napoli on the ship Duca D'Aosta on March 18, 1921, and arrived in New York on Mar 31, 1921. She listed her ultimate destination as Philadelphia, PA. Her passenger paperwork describes her as 5'6", brown hair, and eyes with a natural complexion. She also lists that her mother is in Italy and her brother Dionisio is in Philadelphia.⁴⁵ Shortly after landing she married Alphonso Gaspari Di Carlo (1888-1948) in Philadelphia.⁴⁶ Her husband was a grocery store trucker. In 1930, they had her brother Sante and her husband's brother living with them. Alphonse died in 1948 in Wildwood, New Jersey. Sometime prior to 1940, they moved to New Jersey and were still there during the 1950 census.

They had two sons who lived to adulthood: CASPER JOSEPH DI CARLO (1927-2003) who married Blanche Anna Vaughn and had 3 children. Their other son, MARIO JAMES DI CARLO (1923-2010) married Gloria Matthews and had 3 children (see chart on prior page for additional details).

Anna died when she was 65 (Aug 25, 1953) of a cerebral hemorrhage and is buried in the Holy Cross Cemetery in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

3) Dionisio Lolli was born Aug 21, 1889, in Forcella, Teramo, Abruzzo, Italy. He immigrated to the U.S. in 1907 with Francisco Lolli, his first cousin. They were both found in 1910 working the canals of New York state together and living in the Austrian camp there. Eventually, Dionisio was called 'Danny'. He married his first cousin, Modesta Lolli (1892-1944), daughter of his Aunt Filomena. After his first wife died of pneumonia, Dionisio married Angelina Randazzo (1914-1994).

Dionisio was a veteran of World War I. His WWI draft registration dated Jun 15, 1917, lists a father, mother, 2 sisters, and 8 brothers (2 under 12). Based on this information, we are missing 4 additional sons of his father, Marino Lolli. Dionisio was the owner of the Trieste Hotel in Wildwood, Pennsylvania.

Mrs. Daniel Lolli

Mrs. Modesta Lolli, wife of Daniel Lolli, and owner of the Trieste Hotel in Wildwood, died here Thursday in Pennsylvania Hospital of pneumonia. She was 53. She is survived by a orother, James Ciardelli, proprietor ot a cafe at 2168 Bridge st., and seven nephews, all now in the armed forces. Solemn Requiem Mass will be sung at 10 A. M. Monday at Annunciation Church, 10th and Dickinson sts., with burial in Holy 3ross Cemetery.



Dionisio had a son named Frank D. Lolli (1953-2006) in Philadelphia, PA. Frank married Linda Dermond (1958) and they had at least two kids: Eric Anthony Lolli (1992) lives in New Jersey, and Shannon Marie Lolli (1994) also in New Jersey. Dionisio died on 30 Aug 1970 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

(Parking on premises). 4) Antonio Lolli was born in 1893 in Teramo, Italy. He married Amelia Rosini (1903deceased) of Campli, Italy, on Sep 13, 1924 in Teramo, Italy; he was 31 and his wife was 21. Interesting that only their mothers are on the marriage certificate; Maria Annuziata Sacchetti and Cecelia Rosini. ⁴⁸ No more is known about Antonio at this time. He may have stayed in Italy.

- 5) Domenico Lolli was born in Italy about 1898 in Teramo, Italy. I do not know if he ever immigrated to the U.S. or stayed in Italy. He married Carmina Quercia (1886-deceased) on 16 Jun 1921 in Teramo, Italy; he was 23 and his wife was 35. She was born in Torano Nuovo, Teramo, Abruzzo, Italy to Vincenzo Quercia and Angeladea Valori. 49
- 6) Florinto Lolli was born in 1902 in Teramo, Italy. I do not know if he ever immigrated to the U.S. or stayed in Italy. He married Eurosia Spinozzi (1909-deceased) on 17 Mar 1928 in Basciano, Teramo, Abruzzo, Italy; he was 26 and his wife was 19. Eurosia was born in Guglionesi the daughter of Nazzareno and Elvira d'Alessandro. ⁵⁰



7) Angela Lolli was born in 1906 in Castiglione, Della Valle, Teramo, Abruzzo, Italy. She died in Castelli, Teramo, Abruzzo, Italy on 16 Feb 1930 at the age of 24, never married. ⁵¹

Susan Lolli You are the daughter of Anthony Lolli Dionisio Lolli had another daughter with his second wife, her name was Filomena. She was born in 1863, in Forcella, Italy five years after the birth of her brother, Francisco (our ancestor).

She married a man who was also from Forcella named Giuseppe "Joseph" Ciardelli who was one year older than her. The marriage must have occurred between 1884-1887.

Giuseppe soon became the patriarch of the Lolli family, by being the first to sail between Italy and the United States and then helping other family members in their journey. In some cases, he paid for ships passage, provided housing, and likely helped obtain jobs for most of the Lolli immigrants. At a minimum, they all used his address in Philadelphia on any of their important paperwork as they knew he would always know where to reach everyone.

Filomena and Giuseppe had six children, all born in Forcella, Italy. About a year after their last child was born, her husband Giuseppe became the first of the family to immigrate to America, arriving October 19, 1901, leaving behind his wife and his six children.

Below is a list of their children, their birthdate and age they were when their father left for the United States (#).

Their Children:

- 1. Louise Ciardelli, born 7 Mar 1888 OR 1885 (12-15)
- 2. Modesta Ciardelli, born 11 Dec 1892 (9)
- 3. Giacinta "Jeannette" Ciardelli, born 1894 (7)
- 4. Giovanni "John" Ciardelli, born 18 Apr 1895 (6)
- 5. James Vincenzo Ciardelli, born 20 Aug 1898 (3)
- 6. Grazia "Grace" Ciardelli, born 28 Jun 1900 (1.5)

In 1910, Louise Ciardelli, was the first child to immigrate to the United States along with her husband, Giovanni Cioci, they arrived on Dec 4th.

In 1913, his son Giovanni Ciardelli arrived on the 18th of July.

<u>Twelve years later</u>, on February 25, 1914, Giuseppe was finally reunited with his wife and the remaining four children: Giacinta (30), Modesta (22), James (16) and Grazia (14).

Louise Ciardelli Cioci married her husband in Teramo, Italy on September 22, 1910 and set sail for America less than two months later arriving on December 4, 1910. It appears they had 4 children between 1912–1917. I cannot locate them in the 1910 or 1920 census but I do find her in 1940⁵² living with her eldest son John (28), and his wife Lillian (21). Louisa works 16 hours a week and makes \$80 annually. Strangely, she is listed as widowed but I did find her husband in the same census with a new wife, Jenny Romanelli (1899). They have 5 additional kids with the oldest born in 1927 and the youngest in 1935. Giovanni may have married (or not?) Jenny about 1926. Giovanni Cioci submits his declaration of intention for citizenship⁵³ on

December 4, 1940. In this document he shows Louise as his wife, states she is living with him, and lists <u>all</u> the children as well. Not sure what's the truth here.

I find Louise again in 1950⁵⁴, this time with her (62) brother James (51). Louisa is now listed as 'separated'. They have a niece, Rose Alcaro (36), and her daughter Rita Alcaro (12) living with them. James and Louisa are U.S. citizens (she took the oath on 15 Mar 1944). James is the proprietor of a private club. Her husband and his second family are also visible in Philadelphia.

Louise lives another 23 years and dies in 1973 and is buried in Holy Cross Cemetery in Yeadon, Delaware Co., PA.⁵⁵

Modesta Ciardelli was born on December 11, 1889.⁵⁶ In 1915, she married another Italian immigrant, Domenico Ranalli. In 1920⁵⁷, she was living with her husband and her first cousin, Dionisio Lolli in Philadelphia, PA. Her husband died of a stomach ulcer in 1926. ⁵⁸ Prior to 1940⁵⁹, Modesta had married her first cousin Dionisio (son of her Uncle Marino). Dionisio was a canner at a Tin Can Company making \$500 annually. Modesta died on September 28, 1944, at the young age of 55 of pneumonia caused by heart issues.⁶⁰ She is buried in the Holy Cross Cemetery in Yeadon, Delaware Co., PA.⁶¹

Giacinta Ciardelli was born in Forcella, Italy in 1893. After immigration in 1914, she married in 1915 in Philadelphia to Giovanni Banchini, they had at least five children between 1916-1932. ⁶²

All three of her sons served in World War II; Marco served overseas almost 21 months (13 May 1943 thru 8 Feb 1945); Joseph served overseas for six months prior to being injured (12 Jul 1945 thru 23 Jan 1946); Benjamin Joseph was overseas 14 months (6 Apr 1944 thru 2 Jun 1945) and was in a German prisoner of war camp. Giacinta became a U.S. citizen March 25, 1940. She died 1979.

Giovanni "John" Ciardelli served in the military during World War I and was overseas from 15 Sep 1918 – 25 Apr 1919. He married another Italian immigrant in 1921 when he was twenty-six and she was twenty-nine. He worked in various jobs such as in a retail cigar store and as a cook. He had two children, a daughter and a son. He died on 10 April 1966. ⁶³

James Vincenzo Ciardelli was a veteran and served in World War I. He served overseas from 14 Mar 1918 until 27 April 1919. He was married in 1929 and his wife died soon after. He was a cook in the Army and by 1950 he worked as a proprietor of a private club. He was living with his sister Louise and a niece.

Grazia "Grace" Ciardelli immigrated from Italy with her mother⁶⁴ and married an Italian immigrant in 1923 when she was twenty-three and he was thirty-one. Per the U.S. Census she never attended school but was able to read and write. She is the only one of Filomenia's children who did not stay in Philadelphia but settled in California where her son and her daughter were born. Her son George Milandro served in the Navy during WWII on the USS Enterprise.

All the children except Grazia "Grace" continued to live in Philadelphia for the remainder of their lives. Most were laborers as an occupation.

Filomena died of Pneumonia on April 24,1927. ⁶⁵

Giuseppe Ciardelli died in 1945 ⁶⁶



This chart continues with descendants from **Dionisio Lolli** down through his daughter **Filomena Lolli**.

Based on the immigration dates for Filomena and her husband Giuseppe they had all their children in Italy then <u>only Giuseppe</u> left for the United States. He and his wife did not reconnect until 12 years later! Their children all ultimately migrated to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania with the last, Grace, ending up in California. Some branches of the next generation stayed in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and California, while others moved to New Jersey and Oklahoma. Ultimately, we should be able to find more relatives in those states.



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PART 3 More History

Research on Dionisio Lolli's First Family

DIONISIO'S FIRST FAMILY

Our end-of-line ancestor Dionisio Lolli had a wife and family previously to our ancestor, Angeladea d'Innocenzo.

The first wife's name was <u>Maria Angelica Lucenti</u>. I can assume some basic facts about her based on the birthdates of her children.


She was born before 1835 and probably married Dionisio about 1849 (first son born 1850). She must have died between 1852 and 1855 (her daughter was born in 1852 and first son of next marriage was born in 1856).

Dionisio and Maria Angelica had two children, a **son Carmine** born in 1850 ⁶⁸, and a **daughter Angeladea** born in 1852.⁶⁹ They were both born in Caprafico which is a very small village belonging to the municipality of Guardiagrele, in the province of Chieti, region of Abruzzo. It lies north of Forcella.

Based on Dionisio's kids ages, it is assumed that Carmine and Angeladea were raised in the same household as their half-siblings. They would have been ages 6 and 4 years old when their half-brother Marino was born. We know they remained close since at least one of Carmine's kids immigrated to the United States with his Aunt Filomena.

- 7. Angelica Lolli Binchi (1897, Basciano)

1) Daughter **Antoniella Lolli** was born 1882 in Penna Sant'Andrea, Teramo, Italy. She married Vincenzo Pitchelli (1882-unknown) when they were both about twenty-six. It is not known when they died or if they had any children.⁷¹

2) Daughter **Palomba Lolli** born 1882 in Penna Sant'Andrea, Teramo, Italy. She married Silvestro Di Pietro (1888-unknown) when they were both twenty-eight. She died 26 Jul 1931 in Toricella Sicura, Teramo when she was forty-seven.⁷² Her husband outlived both his wife and his son, and died when he was eighty-three in 1963.⁷³ GIANNINO DI PIETRO was born in 1913 in Teramo, Italy. He died in 1938 when he was a twenty-five in Campli, Teramo, Italy.⁷⁴

- Son Pasquale Lolli born 1 Nov 1885. He died on 19 Sep 1918 in Penna Sant'Andrea, Teramo, Italy at the age of thirtytwo.⁷⁵
- 4) Son Giovanni Lolli born 1888 in Teramo, Italy. Of Carmine's children, it appears that Giovanni is the only one who immigrated to the United States. He arrived on 25 Feb 1914 with his Aunt Filomena and some of her children. He lived in Philadelphia in the same house as his aunt and her husband. But Giovanni's life in the United States was short lived. A little over a year after his immigration he was killed on 17 Jun 1915 when his chest was crushed from a falling trestle. He never married. ⁷⁶
- 5) Daughter **Elizabetta** born 1889 in Miano, Teramo, Abruzzo, Italy. She was married 20 Mar 1930 when she was twentyone and her husband Orazio de Carasa (1886-unknown) was twenty-four. ⁷⁷ Elizabetta died 20 Mar 1931 in Castilenti


- 6) Daughter Luisa Lolli born 1892 in 1892 in Milano, Teramo, Abruzzo, Italy. She married Vincenzo Binchi on 2 Dec 1922 when she was thirty and he was twenty-eight.⁷⁸ They had no known children. It was the second marriage for him. His previous marriage was three years earlier in 1919 so it was likely that his first wife died.⁷⁹
- 7) Daughter Angelica Lolli was born 1897 in Basciano, Teramo, Abruzzo, Italy. She married Gaetano Binchi in 1895 when she was twenty-nine and he was thirty. While he had the same last name as her sister Luisa's husband, they were not brothers but likely related in some way.⁸⁰

It is interesting how much the family moved around in the province. It is assumed that this was Carmine's quest for work.

Through the births of his children, you can ascertain their migration; from <u>Penna Sant' Andrea</u>, to <u>Miano</u>, then <u>Basciano</u>. To illustrate how close these villages are, you could walk between all 3 of the villages in 4.5 hours.

Miano is a very small place in the region of Abruzzo in Italy with a current population of approximately 354 people.

Carmine died 1 Apr 1930 in Castelli, Teramo, Abruzzo, Italy at the age of eighty. Castelli is a nine-hour walk south from where he used to live.




Susan Lolli You are the daughter of Anthony Lolli Dionisio's only daughter with his first wife was named **Angeladea Lolli**. She was born two years after her older brother, in 1852 in Caprafico, Teramo. She married Vincenzo Marinari in Penna Sant' Andrea when she was 27 and he was 20.⁸¹

Their daughter Luisa Marinari was born on 13 Jun 1884.⁸² Luisa's husband was <u>Gaetano Palandrani</u>. Per Luisa's Naturalization petition they had at least five children:

- 1. Vincenzo Paladrani, born 5 Dec 1908, in Teramo, Italy.
- 2. Pasquale Paladrani, born 21 Dec 1910, in Emberville, PA.
- 3. Michelina Paladrani, born 8 May 1914, in Wilmington, DE.
- 4. Sabatino Paladrani, born 8 Nov 1919, in Wilmington, DE.
- 5. Louis Paladrani, born 30 Jun 1925, in Wilmington, DE.

Gaetano left Italy in March of 1909. Luisa and her son Vincenzo followed less than a year later and arrived on January 23, 1910. Like most of our relatives, they left Italy from Naples, but they sailed to Philadelphia versus New York.

PART4 DNA RESEARCH

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DNA DISCOVERIES

DNA stands for deoxyribonucleic (dee-OK-see-ri-bo-new-klee-ik) acid. It is the genetic information inside the cells of the body that helps make people who they are. Think of DNA as instructions for how to make the body, like the blueprints for a house.

Your DNA contains a record of your ancestors, but you are not a carbon copy of any one of them. The mix of DNA you inherit is unique to you. You receive 50% of your DNA from each of your parents, who received 50% of theirs from each of their parents, and so on. Siblings get all their genetic information from the same two people, but the mix will vary. Sometimes, one sibling could have one or more ethnicities that another sibling does not. To get a comprehensive view of ancestry its best to include testing from all siblings.

Genetic genealogy is another tool available to help discover

our family history. It uses DNA testing, combined with traditional genealogy, to help identify ancestors and family members.


Our research shows that the Lolli side of the family comes from the Italian region of Abruzzi which is geographically in the northern part of Italy but characteristically a part of southern Italy.


The family line of my father's mother was <u>Lungaro</u>, and my mother's family lines are <u>Camarata</u> and <u>Yannello</u> (lannello). All three of these families are from Sicily, in Southern Italy. So, we can assume LOLLI is a minimum of the Northern Italy DNA listed but, you'll also notice there is Southern Italy DNA listed for every Lolli match pictured here. It appears that the Lolli family cannot be strictly classified as Northern Italian.


On the remaining charts, you will see my (Susan Lolli) DNA labeled 'You' on the left, as compared to a Lolli DNA match on the right.

Notice: there are three ethnicities that I have but my brother does not, and one that my brother has that I do not. We would still need to consider the combined mix to find ancestors.






